Bhutan's visitor profiles reflect a diverse mix of nationalities and demographics; yet are all unified in their quest for something extraordinary, and find themselves drawn by Bhutan's magnetic charm. The "Bhutan Believe" national brand, once met with scepticism, matures into a powerful emblem of the country's vision, blending heritage with progress. It captures Bhutan's essence, a nation honouring its past while navigating the future with innovation and insight.

Bhutan's Strategic Approach

Bhutan's commitment to Gross National Happiness continues to underscore its "Development with Values" philosophy and inform various strategies in all areas, including tourism, which emphasises quality over quantity. The country remains a custodian of its unique spiritual and cultural heritage and its tourism model prioritises its ecological and cultural ethos while embracing beneficial and non-invasive technological advancements.

The Gelephu Mindfulness City (GMC) reflects this fusion, emerging as a sanctuary where ancient wisdom and modern advancements merge, and offering visitors a visionary experience of sustainable tourism and urban living. The introduction of GMC, with its modern amenities like enhanced transportation, ease of access, and familiar brand stores, is poised to transform it into a welcoming hub for those previously deterred by Bhutan's perceived ruggedness, potentially establishing GMC as the main

gateway and positioning the rest of Bhutan as an authentic “outback” travel experience.

Every year, the GMC welcomes guests who enjoy its Vajrayana centres of spirituality, its various meditation and Buddhism courses, and who attend its World Environmental Forum, similar to the one held in Davos.

Infrastructure and Service Upgrades

Over the past decade, since 2024, Bhutan has revolutionised its infrastructure and services, significantly boosting the tourism sector. The country’s aviation has expanded, offering more flights and routes, and enhancing accessibility for international visitors. Western travellers have direct connectivity to Bhutan through major airports in the Middle East and Europe, while Bhutanese airlines have also partnered with international airlines; easing travel for guests (i.e. end-to-end checked luggage). An expanded network of helicopters enables guests the opportunity to visit the less accessible regions of Bhutan. Enhanced online payment systems have improved the convenience and enjoyment of guests, reflecting a broader shift toward digital integration across Bhutan’s tourism industry, both on-site and prior to arrival.

This era of digital enhancement spans the entire tourism landscape, making interactions smoother and cutting down on needless bureaucracy and paperwork. For instance, personalised passport systems allow trusted travellers to visit and/or return with ease. Bhutan has also made great strides in educating and training its tourism workforce, ensuring they meet the high standards expected in today’s hospitality world which has improved the quality of service across the board.

Efforts to streamline services have reduced red tape and increased efficiency, while investment in staff education and training has raised service quality to meet global standards. The increase in employment demand causes Bhutanese working abroad to return home, bringing their experience learned in international hospitality with them. Additionally, efforts in waste management have markedly improved guest satisfaction. Regulatory and operational enhancements have made doing business in Bhutan smoother and more responsive to guests’ needs, reflecting the country’s commitment to hospitality excellence.

Bhutanese cuisine has become globally recognised and applauded, spurring the growth of restaurants across the nation, and motivating guests to explore more expansively within Bhutan to experience its diverse regional specialties.

In addition, Bhutan invested in better infrastructure for guests with disabilities or mobility issues, allowing it to be positioned as a truly accessible destination.

Environmental Management

Over the years, Bhutan has meticulously preserved its breathtaking landscapes and natural splendour, thanks to a steadfast commitment to environmental guardianship. The nation's approach to tourism, deeply entrenched in sustainability and conservation, plays a pivotal role in safeguarding its environmental sanctity, setting a benchmark for ecological responsibility globally. In line with this, Bhutan launched an exciting range of eco-friendly guest activities that not only showcase its natural wonders but also emphasise their protection and sustainability.

These experiences allow visitors to delve into some of the planet's most pristine and ecologically rich areas, promoting a culture of conservation and respect for nature. Engaging activities like fishing for the elusive golden mahseer, bird watching, zero waste culinary tours, tracking the rare snow leopard, climate change education trails, eco-village homestays, wildlife safaris, and photography tours dedicated to nature, have all resonated with guests who prioritise environmental mindfulness.

Impact programmes have been implemented to encourage and incentivise guests to travel with less carbon emissions and to contribute to Bhutan's efforts to remain carbon-negative. Furthermore, zones have been established within the boundaries of national parks that permit a set number of guests to visit the most protected regions of the parks while also creating a buffer between the parks and communities in an effort to prevent human-wildlife conflicts.

Technology

Bhutan's innovative approach of integrating its rich traditions with cutting-edge technology garnered widespread media attention. The nation adeptly harnessed technological advancements to augment the guest experience and provide valuable feedback to the tourism industry for means of development, all the while safeguarding its environmental and cultural heritage.

Visitors remarked that the use of AI and virtual reality in select locations across Bhutan was a game-changer, complementing rather than overshadowing the genuine Bhutanese encounters and the invaluable insights provided by the guides.

It was fascinating for them to virtually interact with historical figures like *Drukpa Kuenley*, diving deeper into his unconventional Buddhist teachings. Families embarked on a virtual treasure hunt guided by *Pema Lingpa* and experienced a simulated trek alongside a *Migoi* (yeti) in eastern Bhutan. These innovative engagements deeply enriched their understanding and appreciation of Bhutan's cultural depth and legacy.

Family Travel and Educational Tourism

In an era where travel extends beyond the confines of leisure, Bhutan cleverly incorporated family engagement and educational enrichment into its tourism narrative. These all aim to impart knowledge

and foster a global community respectful of our interconnected planet, enhancing Bhutan's contribution to international understanding.

In parallel, Bhutan also enhanced family-oriented travel services, ensuring that its educational offerings are complemented by world-class facilities. With an eye on the complex needs of family travellers, Bhutan has boosted its hospitality infrastructure, transportation, and entertainment options to provide delightful, hassle-free, and enriching experiences for families, including those travelling with infants. Innovations like adventure zones, and child-focused cultural tours, merge entertainment with education.

Wellness

A decade after the transformative impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, the allure of wellness travel has not only endured but has expanded, becoming a cornerstone of international tourism. Bhutan, renowned for its pristine landscapes and long association with traditional healing, has positioned itself at the forefront of this sector.

Bhutan has capitalised on its ambience and medicinal traditions to enhance its offerings in health and wellness tourism. The country now features a diverse range of holistic retreats that blend ancient Bhutanese healing practices with modern wellness skills. Guests at these retreats immerse themselves in practices that combine age-old rituals, herbal remedies, and spiritual wellness, to achieve deep healing and awareness.

Across Bhutan, various tourism providers offer experiences that aim to harmonise the physical, mental, and spiritual needs of their guests. Nestled in beautiful mountain hideaways, meditation and yoga retreats provide personalised programmes that encourage serenity and self-discovery. Wellness centres offer traditional Bhutanese treatments that use only native plants, minerals, and age-old healing methods. Hotels encourage meditation and yoga as the daily morning activity. People travel from all over the world to bathe in the world's most medicinal natural hot springs (which are known to heal a wide variety of illnesses), set in natural landscapes with clean and modern amenities. Wild, medicinal herbs are widely available for guests to take during their travels and their benefits are clearly labelled since many Western guests are unfamiliar with them.

Adventure Tourism

Over the last 10 years, since 2024, Bhutan has carved out its niche as an unparalleled haven for adventure seekers. While the kingdom continues to honour its sacred virgin peaks by restricting climbs above 7,000 metres, it invites adventurers to explore its lesser heights. Other activities like rafting, paragliding, zip-lining, and bungee jumping are hugely popular, all tailored to the thrill-seeker, yet grounded in respect for Bhutan's traditions and environment.

The Snowman Race, considered one of the hardest ultra-marathons in the world, is now one of the world's most prestigious ultra-marathon events, drawing elite athletes and significant global attention and sponsorship. The same applies to the Tour of the Dragon cycle race. But Bhutan also pioneers sustainable thrill, integrating eco-friendly innovations like cable cars that blend seamlessly with the natural panorama and cutting-edge helicopter tours powered by green aviation fuels.

Entertainment

Bhutan is making waves in the global entertainment scene, emerging as a favourite destination for international film productions and music concerts. Filmmakers from around the world are drawn to its untouched natural beauty and rich cultural backdrop, making it a hotspot for a variety of cinematic projects. At the same time, they conscientiously craft content that respects Bhutan's cultural heritage, maintaining a delicate balance between artistic expression and cultural integrity. Guests flock to see the locations where their favourite films were shot in Bhutan or see their favourite artists perform.

At the same time, there is a burgeoning scene in Bhutanese film and music that is starting to make its mark. The local film industry is blossoming, showcasing a range of genres that appeal to audiences both at home and abroad, and capturing the essence of Bhutan's stories and traditions. Bhutanese music is also hitting its stride, merging traditional tunes with modern vibes to create a unique sound that is uniquely Bhutanese.

This surge in film and music has helped project Bhutanese culture onto the world stage. It has offered a platform for Bhutan to tell its own stories and celebrate its heritage.
